## Call for Proposals AAL-2008-1

### Guide for applicants: Part B (structured proposal template) for

### AAL collaborative projects

An AAL proposal consists of two parts<sup>1</sup>.

**Part A** will contain the **administrative information** about the proposal and the participants. The information requested includes a brief description of the work, contact details and characteristics of the participants, and information related to the funding requested.

This information will be encoded in a structured database for further computer processing to produce, for example, statistics and evaluation reports. This information will also support the experts and Commission staff during the evaluation process.

The information in Part A will have to be entered through a set of on-line forms which is available here: <http://proposals.aal-europe.eu/>.

**Part B** is a structured template that you should follow when presenting the scientific and technical content of your proposal. The template is designed to highlight those aspects that will be assessed against the evaluation criteria. It covers, among other things, the nature of the proposed work, the participants and their roles in the proposed project, and the impacts that might be expected to arise from the proposed work.

Please keep to maximum page lengths where these are specified (in Arial 10-point). The AAL Association may instruct the independent expert assessors to disregard any excess pages. Even where no page limits are given, or where limits are only recommended, it is in your interest to keep your text concise since over-long proposals are rarely viewed in a positive light by the evaluating experts.

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## Section 1: Objectives

Please explain how, and in what way the project will contribute to the advancement of knowledge in the field.

### 1.3 Improve quality of life

Describe how the project will improve the quality of life of elderly people either directly or indirectly and how they will be improve accessibility. Describe how user acceptance and usability as well as social relevance can be achieved.

### 1.4 Legal and ethical issues

Explain any legal and ethical compliance issues. Describe how the projects results will respect the privacy and dignity of the elderly, and how any relevant national and international guidelines are taken into account. Please also complete the table in Annex 1.

## Section 2: Work Plan, deliverables and efficiency of implementation

This section assesses the overall quality of the project plan, and the extent to which the proposed project methodology and consortium procedures will be able to deliver the planned final deliverables. It will also describe the deployment of the necessary resources; the scientific, technical and market expertise needed to achieve the project goals, and who is responsible within the consortium for different aspects.

### 2.1 Concept and methodology

Please describe how the proposal will lead to a novel and effective solution, based on a scientifically and technically sound concept.

2 pages max.

### 2.2 Work plan (organisation)

Please describe the organisation of the activities and the work plan (tasks, sequencing, meetings, and deliverables). Please:

- i) Describe how the consortium will consider adequate quality assurance and control procedures regarding the development and release of external project deliverables, as appropriate to each specific type of deliverable (e.g. management reports, research notes, market studies, application or service prototypes, etc.).
- ii) Indicate and justify the budget.
- iii) Explain how the consortium will address any significant risks,
- iv) describe the contingency plan and explain how the resources are mobilized.

Please also complete Annex 2. The timing of the different WPs and their components should be shown in a graphical presentation of the various components (Pert diagram or similar).

### 2.3 Resources needed

Describe the resources needed to be deployed and the scientific, technical and market expertise needed to achieve the project goals.

### 2.4 Demonstration of the objectives and pilot application

Describe how the proposal includes as part of planned activities / outcomes a realistic prototype or pilot application (testing in a realistic user environment) at project completion, where the expected impacts to meet specific end user needs stated in the initial proposal may be demonstrated to the fullest feasible extent.

## Section 3: Roles and contributions of the consortium partners

This section assesses the extent to which the consortium composition includes the critical mass and diversity of competencies and infrastructure required for the successful completion of the defined tasks.

### 3.1 Quality of the Consortium

Please describe the quality of the partners and the complementarity of expertise. Ensure that essential actors of the value network are involved and that end-users and SMEs are playing a proactive role in the consortium. What is the balance of contribution between partners and the added value of the international collaboration?

### 3.2 User inclusion

Please describe the inclusion of studies concerning accessibility, user acceptance and usability in the work plan. How will the project create new and innovative solutions to specific end user needs that result in improvement in the quality of life of elderly people?

### 3.3 Available resources

Explain how the mobilization of the available resources is to be achieved.

### 3.4 Project management

Describe the management of the project (e. g. organisational structure, conflict resolution procedures/ mechanisms and rules of protection of partners' IPR).
