The Ministerial Expert Group on Simplification prepared its 2nd Report and was delivered to the research ministers under AOBs at the meeting of the Council Competitiveness in Brussels on 31 May 2011.

Simplification Recommendations of the Group

(i) Interest Yielding Bank Accounts:

The Group welcomes the abolishment of the interest yielding bank accounts from 2012. The Group highlights that the self executing nature of this rule allows early applicability, independently from the status of the IR.

(ii) Extended Use of Lump Sums and Prizes (Inter alia...)

The Group underlines the importance of uniform and transparent interpretation and clear methodologies paving the way for the wider use of lump sums.

The Group welcomes the inducement prizes planned to be introduced by the Commission in 2012, and, to this end, it invites the Commission to provide the timing and the structure as soon as possible.

Preparations for the FP8

The Commission immediately lounched a Europe – wide public consultation by *Internet* and performed many stakeholder consultations between 9th February and 20th May.

They have received 1303 responses and further 775 positions papers.

A huge conference will be organised in Brussels on the Common Strategic Framework in Brussels tomorrow. Keynote speakers will be Mme Geoghegan-Quinn and some of the Commissioners, MEPs and Minister Zoltán Cséfalvay, Chair of the Competitiveness Council under the Hungarian Presidency.

Strengthening Europe's science base and European Research Area Points for debate

- By focusing strongly on the track record of the applicant (e.g. number of publications in highly rated journals), the ERC only funds established scientists and does not attract talented young researchers.
- The EU should not deal with the actual construction of large scale research infrastructures, this is for the Member States. The EU should only support access and networking.
- The CSF should keep a very strict focus on excellence. Capacity building is the responsibility of the Member States and should be addressed through the Structural Funds.

Tackling societal challenges *Points for debate*

- When addressing societal challenges, what would be the best way to ensure that applicants come forward with the most creative solutions (e.g. set targets to be achieved or through descriptions of expected outcomes)?
- While we agree that joint programming initiatives (i.e. pooling EU and national funding resources) unlocks more potential, how can this process be best advanced within the CSF?
- In addressing societal challenges in the CSF, should collaborative research projects be supported as they are today in the Cooperation programme of FP7?

Strengthening competitiveness *Points for debate*

- The best contribution EU funding can make to stimulating innovation is to focus its resources on creating an excellent European research base. Are closer to the market activities to be financed for industry itself?
- Both public-private partnerships (such as those used in the wake of the European Economic Recovery Package, e.g. on the green car) and Joint Technology Initiatives (such as the one that addresses innovative medicines) are powerful tools, but how can we ensure they are best used and optimised?
- Should the CSF support research performing high tech SMEs, and not medium and low tech ones, which would be better supported at the national and regional level?
